Pac margin calculations has some errors and need to be updated.

Proposed Remedy

- 1. Update Pac_marging in Table 145-15 item 4 with the following numbers per class and add the necessary rows as shown.
- 2. Editor may merge entries with differences ≤ 0.1 W.

Group prefers the extra margins in D3.2 and increasing Class 8 from 1.4W to 1.5W.

Annex B – Connector resistance

From ANSI/TIA-568-C.2-2009, APPROVED: AUGUST 11, 2009

6.8.1 DC resistance

DC resistance shall be measured in accordance with ASTM D4566 at $\underline{20 \text{ °C} \pm 3 \text{ °C}}$ for all connecting hardware cable pairs.

NOTE – DC resistance is a separate measurement from contact resistance as specified in Annex A. Whereas DC resistance is measured to determine the connector's ability of transmit direct current and low frequency signals, contact resistance is measured to determine the reliability and stability of individual electrical connections.

Category 3 connecting hardware DC resistance between the input and the output connections of the connecting hardware (not including the cable stub, if any) used to terminate 100 Ω twisted-pair cabling shall not exceed **0.3** Ω

Category 5e, 6, and 6A connecting hardware DC resistance between the input and the output connections of the connecting hardware (not including the cable stub, if any) used to terminate 100 Ω twisted-pair cabling shall not exceed $\underline{\textbf{0.2 }\Omega}$.
